Understanding Alzheimer's and Dementia

Alzheimer's is the most common cause of dementia, a general term for memory loss and other cognitive abilities serious enough to interfere with daily life. Alzheimer's disease accounts for 60-80% of dementia cases.

Alzheimer's is not a normal part of aging. The greatest known risk factor is increasing age, and the majority of people with Alzheimer's are 65 and older. Alzheimer's disease is considered to be younger-onset Alzheimer's if it affects a person under 65. Younger-onset can also be referred to as early-onset Alzheimer's. People with younger-onset Alzheimer's can be in the early, middle or late stage of the disease.

Alzheimer's worsens over time. Alzheimer's is a progressive disease, where dementia symptoms gradually worsen over a number of years. In its early stages, memory loss is mild, but with late-stage Alzheimer's, individuals lose the ability to carry on a conversation and respond to their environment. On average, a person with Alzheimer's lives 4 to 8 years after diagnosis but can live as long as 20 years, depending on other factors.

Alzheimer's has no cure, but two treatments — (aducanumab Aduhelm[™])and lecanemab (Leqembi®) — demonstrate that removing beta-amyloid, one of the hallmarks of Alzheimer's disease, from the brain reduces cognitive and functional decline in people living with early Alzheimer's. Other treatments can temporarily slow the worsening of dementia symptoms and improve quality of life for those with Alzheimer's and their caregivers. Today, there is a worldwide effort underway to find better ways to treat the disease, delay its onset and prevent it from developing.



Senior of the Month ~ Janie Berry

Janie was born in Willesden, England. Her parents lived mainly in Cambridge and owned pubs, which supported the family. She has a passion for horses which started at about age 3. She was on a donkey, on a beach, and Janie threw her first temper tantrum when they tried taking her off the donkey. She got her first horse at age 9, but not before her Dad made her work for two years in the neighbor's stable. She had to work for everything she had. She went through "secondary" school, and graduated at age 15, which is the equivalent of a high school diploma. She got a job right away as a secretary which she worked at until she moved to the United States at 19 years of age. Her parents separated and her Mom brought her, kicking and screaming, to the San Fernando Valley where her half-sister lived. She went back to England to visit, and the second time, she saw the same guy sitting on the same bar stool, complaining about the same thing and decided that the U.S.A. was the place for her after all; plus she could support herself over here too.



She met Michael Landon in 1974 at Toys R Us while working there, Tom Jones in 1978 while playing darts at a pub in Santa Monica and John Wayne at an immigration office in L.A., running into him coming off an escalator, where he said "are you ok little lady" and helped her compose herself.

Facts About Love That Will Seriously Make Your Heart Smile



1. Eye contact is key. Some extraordinary research has found that couples who are in love and bond in a romantic relationship synchronize their heart rates after gazing into each others' eyes for three minutes.

2. Love works fast. It only takes up to 4 minutes to decide whether you like someone or not.

3. Love can be addictive. Falling in love is much like taking a dose of cocaine, as both experiences affect the brain similarly and trigger a similar sensation of euphoria. Research found that falling in love produces several euphoria-inducing chemicals that stimulate 12 areas of the brain at the same time.

4. There's a reason why cuddling feels so good. Oxytocin, the so-called love or cuddle hormone, is produced during an embrace or cuddle.

5. Your heart can actually break. Research has provided evidence that intense, traumatizing events, such as a break-up, divorce, loss of a loved one, physical separation from a loved one, or betrayal can cause real physical pains in the area of one's heart. This condition is called the Broken Heart Syndrome.

6. Biologically, your love changes with time. It is estimated that romantic love, which is linked with euphoria, dependence, sweaty palms, butterflies and alike, only lasts about a year. After that first year begins the so-called "committed love" stage. The transition is linked with elevated neurotrophin protein levels in newly formed couples.

7. Love goes hand in hand with stress. Studies show that people at an early stage of love have lower levels of serotonin, which is associated with feelings of happiness and well-being, and higher levels of cortisol, associated with stress.

8. Priorities change when looking for a long term companion. There's evidence that when looking for a fling, the body wins over the face on a physical attraction basis. The opposite is true, however, for those who are looking for a long-term relationship partner.

9. Feelings make life that much sweeter. Researchers looked at a group of people, and found that those who were thinking about love said a specific kind of food was sweeter than those thinking about jealousy or something neutral.

10. Some people can't feel love. Some individuals who claim never to have felt romantic love suffer from

hypopituitarism, a rare disease that doesn't allow a person to feel the rapture of love.

11. Your body has a "vein of love." Engagement rings are often worn on the fourth finger of the left hand because the ancient Greeks maintained that that finger contains the vena amoris, or the "vein of love," that runs straight to the heart.

12. Sometimes, your emotions play tricks on your heart. Getting dumped often leads to "frustration attraction," which causes an individual to love the one who dumped him or her even more.

13. Love is chaos. The enduring symbol of love, Cupid (or Eros) is said to have come from Chaos ("The Yawning Void") and represents the primitive forces of love and desire.

14. 'Love' is a word derived from Sanskrit. The term "love" is from the Sanskrit lubhyati, meaning "desire."

15. The parent trap. Some psychologists argue that we fall in love with someone who is similar to the parent with whom we have unresolved childhood issues, unaware we are seeking to resolve this childhood relationship in adulthood.

16. Add a little adventure to your life. Studies show that if a man meets a woman in a dangerous situation (and vice versa), such as on a trembling bridge, he is more likely to fall in love with her than if he met her in a more mundane setting, such as in an office.

17. Eye contact is key. Scientists suggest that merely staring into another person's eyes is a strong precursor to love. In an experiment, strangers of the opposite sex were put in a room together for 90 minutes where they talked about intimate details and then stared into each other's eyes without talking. Many felt a deep attraction for each other, and two married each other six months later.

In the colder months, the use of natural gas appliances like water heaters,

furnaces and ovens can go up. Schedule a free gas appliance check with SDG&E to make sure your appliances are working properly and efficiently to help keep gas bills lower. Getting your appliances inspected is a great way to help prevent carbon monoxide poisoning too.

One of SDG&E's gas technicians will come to your home or business to inspect your natural gas appliances. There are several complimentary services:

*Light and inspect gas pilot lights. Make sure pilot lights and burner flames are a clear blue.

*Check that gas appliances are operating safely and efficiently and not emitting carbon monoxide.

*Ensure gas furnaces are working properly and inspect the condition of the filter which improves the furnace's heating ability.

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
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
